Frequently dismissed as a 'nature poet' and an 'Indian Princess,' E. Pauline Johnson (1861-1913) was not only an accomplished thinker and writer but a contentious and passionate personality who 'talked back' to Euro-Canadian cuture."

Dr. Strong-Boag is a historian and Professor of Women's Studies and Educational Studies at the University of British Columbia. **Dr. Gerson** is a Professor of English at Simon Fraser University. They are co-authors of *Paddling Her Own Canoe: Time and Texts of E. Pauline Johnson, Tekahionwake (2000) and E. Pauline Johnson: Collected Poetry and Selected Prose.* (2002).

Dr. Gerson is a Fellow of the Royal Society of Canada and currently is a member of the editorial team of the History of the Book in Canada project, for which she is the co-editor (with Jacques Michon) of Volume 3, 1918-1980. **Dr. Strong-Boag** is a Fellow of the Royal Society of Canada and former President of the Canadian Historical Association. She is presently working on a history of adoption in Canada, and an edition (with Michelle Rosa) of the diaries of Nellie L. McClung.
