Lesbians and Breast Cancer: What Do We Know -And What Do We Need to Know? (D1)

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In the early 1990s the media reported lesbians' "increased risk" of breast cancer: 1 in 3 (relative to 1 in 8 for heterosexual women). In fact, we do not know whether lesbians are at increased risk of breast cancer - the relevant research has not (yet) been done. We only know that lesbians commonly share certain 'lifestyle' factors (e.g. less likely to have children, tendency to be overweight, higher than average alcohol consumption) which are considered risk factors for breast cancer. Nor do we do (yet) know much about the specific experience of lesbians who do develop breast cancer, or that of their partners. It is typically assumed that this experience will be no different from that of heterosexual women - yet lesbians have to face heterosexist assumptions and practices throughout the healthcare system, and there <u>is</u> research showing how detrimental this can be. Further, we cannot simply assume that women partnering women will respond to - and cope with - the threat of breast cancer in the same way as do heterosexual couples. I present some preliminary findings from a study of lesbian couples' experience of breast cancer to highlight how much more we need to know, and to identify some of the key issues future research needs to address.

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
